Making Hispanic Ministry



Greetings from CHM Director David Byrne

It is people who make up ministry. All of the programs and strategies in the world cannot raise up a new church or ministry unless an individual is touched by and used of God, and that requires a certain courage and, of course, faith.

Since last August, it has been my privilege to have ongoing

fellowship with a good friend, pastor and church leader from Northern Mexico as he has been recovering in and out of local hospitals and extended care facilities in Houston. He and his wife are two of those people of courage and faith who shape the lives of those who cross their path.

Felipe Vásquez and his wife Susie are extraordinary people. Felipe found the Lord at about 20 years old when he had traveled to a small town in south Texas to work the fields. Before long he was helping as an associate pastor. His girlfriend's family didn't want her to marry him because he was Mexican, but Susie (who was born in the U.S.) recognized her companion in ministry and they now share over 57 years together serving God in ministry in many towns across Mexico.

In one of their more difficult assignments, in southern Mexico, the town actively resisted both them and the Gospel. The people would not sell food or other goods to them and put continued pressure on them to leave the area. After a year or so, with things still in crisis, a newborn baby was left on the steps of their home. Felipe and Susie took her in to care for her.

People in the town reacted with accusations that it must be Felipe's own child from one of the local girls and things got even worse. After several weeks it was discovered who the girl was and the circumstances of the birth so that it was very clear not only that Felipe had not been involved, but also that Felipe and Susie had acted in sacrificial love in taking in the infant girl. That was the beginning of years of fruitful ministry.

Hispanic ministry, like any ministry, relies on God's people stepping up and doing their part. CHM cannot do the ministry that needs to be done in the many communities around the country, but working together to encourage, equip, and facilitate ministry we are seeing ongoing fruit. Hospital visitation is not CHM's primary focus, but what a privilege it is to walk with people of courage and faith through life's path!


